CHÂTEAU DE LA BARBEN





HISTORY

The château, "Castrum" of "Barbentum" (latin) is mentioned for the first time in the year of 1064 in a property registration of the abbey Saint Victor de Marseille, at that time owners of the land.

In the 15th century the castle was a property of King René who sold it in the year of 1474 to Jean de Forbin. The fortress remained in the hands of the illustrious family Forbin for 500 years and amongst other happenings, sheltered the love affair of Princess Pauline Borghese, sister of Napoleon I, with his chamberlain: Auguste de Forbin, who later became curator of the royal museums and was a childhood friend to Marius Granet.

Modifications of the site have originated from a revolt against the Edict of the Elected emanating from Richelieu in 1630.

During the rebellion, a gang known as "Cascaveous", which were advancing on La Barben, set fire to the forest and a part of the fortress.

King Louis XIII condemned the Aix communities, which had participated in this riot to give compensation to the Lord of La Barben. Gaspard de Forbin received 1500000 livras to restore his castle.

Thanks to Gaspard de Forbin, who was the first consul of Aix-en-Provence, Prosecutor of the region and faithful to Louis XIII, important parts of the feudal castle got rebuilt in the 17th century. (The Cascaveous had burnt these parts.)

During that time, the Castle got transformed into a place of pleasure. The medieval fortress firmly encamped high on the rocks, took full advantage of the Age of the Enlightenment and became a castle where austerity and classicism got combined to give the building a unique picturesque charm.

Owed to the numerous stays from the famous painter Marius Granet, from the years of 1798, the decoration of two bouldoirs and numerous other decorative elements have marked the castle in his memory.


In 1909, the region got shook by an earthquake destroying the west medieval "Palaméde" tower which after two years got reconstructed on the same rock.

The castle presents an exceptional Location:

Descriptions

The château:

Château La Barben, situated between Salon de Provence and Aix-en-Provence, is one of the oldest and most beautiful castles in the Provence-Alpes-Côte d'Azur region. The famous painter, Marius Granet, who was born in Aix-en-Provence, stayed at the château numerous times and wrote: "La Barben is the most ancient and the most picturesque castle in Provence".

Located in a spectacular setting, it is overlooking an oasis of greenery that grows aside the riverbanks of the rivers Vallon de Maurel and la Touloubre. Which according to certain authors was the ancient Pisavis near which the route Aurélienne was found.

Situated on a big rocky crag, making it impregnable, the fortified castle was built for purpose of defence for the area. Its towers, turrets and its suspended terraces blend into perfect harmony with nature, forming a unity that confers to this site its beauty and its mystery.

Passing through the first postern, one discovers all the architectural elements that are typical of medieval fortresses: watchtowers with pulleys from the former drawbridge, crenulations and machicolation, arrow slits, the coat of arms and the motto of the lords of the place.

Walking up the monumental staircase, one arrives at the grand terrace of honour from where a splendid view extends beyond Salon of Provence and the pond of Berre. A pathway from this terrace leads to the gothic chapel.

In the south, between the medieval towers a charming little chateau with wrought iron windows and wrought-iron balconies, dating back to the classical era, adjoined by a superb Henry IV staircase define the scenery.

Inside:

The inside of the château is composed of about sixty rooms each with its own architectural and decorative specificity. The chapel, big guardrooms, spiral staircases, fireplaces and subterranean passages are reminders of the medieval era, creating the best part of the castle namely is its warm inviting atmosphere.

Superb French style ceilings, dating back to the Renaissance and 17th Century, are elements of glory in this castle.

Tapestries from Flanders, Brussels and Aubusson are elements the unique selection of tastefully decorated walls. One room, especially, which is covered with leather pieces from Cordoba originally from the castle of Vauvenargues. These very rare leather pieces known as "gilded polychrome" were ordered from a craftsman in Aix-en-Provence in 1680.

Beautiful gypsum sculptures from the 18th century, located in the reception rooms, the dining room and the bedrooms, are reminders of the proximity of Aix-en-Provence. A reception room covered with mural paintings representing the Versailles Gardens was probably decorated at the same time as the French style garden designed by Le Nôtre.

During the French Revolution, the castle was not damaged.



In 1797, a marriage was arranged between the owner of the castle, Palamède de Forbin, and a rich heiress from Grasse. Both acting as patrons, invited artists which created various decorations for the interior and exterior premises.

As early as 1798, the famous painter Marius Granet could be found in La Barben. He was the inseparable friend of Auguste de Forbin who was Palamède's brother. The painter who was a regular guest at La Barben, took an active part in its decoration.

The reading room painted in the style of the loggias by Raphaël in 1798, and the very elegant Pompeiian boudoir painted in 1808 for Pauline Borghèse, who was Napoleon's sister and Auguste de Forbin's mistress, show, how much intimate refined places were appreciated in those days.

Event usage:

The property consists of the 307 ha with a large hunting ground for deer and game birds and is also crossed by two rivers, very famous for fishing.

The castle, with its outbuildings, has a total area of 5.185m2. Alongside the chateau there is the guardian's apartment, a studio in the watchtower and a house at the end of the garden fenced with a wall.

Some buildings have been set up for receptions; others have not yet been designated for a certain purpose. There is great potential to exploit.

Currently the castle is open to visitors, which on average reach the proud number of 28,000 a year. The castle has laid out five guest rooms, which turn out to be an international success. Weddings and seminars are organized in a way for each guest living moments of their dreams.

Gardens:

With great thanks to Louis de Forbin who was captain of the Navy and Lieutenant General of the Armies of King Louis XIV, the estate has been enhanced with beautiful gardens (around the 15thcentury).

He has built the great ramparts, the granaries and the vaulted subterranean parts that lead to the splendid French garden, a garden had he assigned to be designed by André Le Nôtre who has also been the famous gardener of Louis XIV.

In this garden seven beds of boxwood embellished with flowery embroideries are distributed around a circular basin where Princess Pauline Borghese, the young sister of Napoleon I, used to bathe. In the centre of one of the flowerbeds stands a giant sequoia, brought back from America after the war of Independence.


Under the ramp leading up to the castle, orange groves and greenhouses are followed by arcades, which allow a glimpse at the rock blocks on which the whole building is built. In the extension of the architectural boxwood two lateral staircases, framing another basin, introduce a terrace adorned in its centre with a graceful goddess.

The garden ends with a monumental fountain, surmounted by a pedicle, flanked by three very beautiful pots.

Plan pris au niveau de la grande terrasse




Plan premier étage





Plan étage supérieur






Salle d'accueil CHATEAU H5P 460m


Plan RDC Palamède de Forbin




Plan étage Palamède de Forbin




Plan sous sol Palamède de Forbin



Plan terrasse Palamède de Forbin





